#### NIGHT CHAPEL IMPACTS STUDENTS BY ENRICHING THEIR SPIRITUAL LIVES

Offered on Wednesday evenings at 8pm, Night Chapel is a time of gathering that may be more accessible and fitting to the student schedule since it takes place after classes and practice. But it is much more than a chance to pass CM-100!

#### What goes on at Night Chapel?

Students gather to participate in reflective and intimate worship that connects them with God and with others. From the Scriptures, they discuss the teachings of Jesus and deepen their understanding of how they are to implement his words and actions into their daily living. They hear from each other by talking about their relationship with God and testifying how God is present in their lives. Through singing and praying together, students worship God in one voice of devotion and adoration for God. Fellowship and community are formed by bearing one another's burdens, often sharing the struggles and stress that is present in their lives and offering them to the Father on behalf of one another in prayer. Students are reminded of their oneness with each other through the Holy Spirit and partake in the Lord's Supper as one family of believers who gather on Wednesday evenings.

# What makes Night Chapel, Night Chapel?

Curated by the Campus Ministry team, students being led by students is main contributor to what makes Night Chapel dynamic in its intimacy and depth. Made up of senior Carina Haas, juniors Tyler King and Jenna Ulery, and sophomore Bryn Taylor, they meet weekly to discern how God is leading students. Some themes that Campus Ministry team has led Night Chapel through are community, prayer for one another, and lament. Through prayer and deliberation, the team seeks out students and empower them




to serve on Wednesday evening whether it is sharing their story, leading music, or delivering a message. Giving the opportunity to lead is key to enriching the spiritual lives of students because they learn to foster an environment of discipleship and spiritual development while participating in pastoring a group of those desiring to follow Jesus. Furthermore, the experience of being led by students creates a strong connection between those who serve and those who attend and participate.

The intimacy and depth that result from the student leadership of this worship gathering is enacted through creative practices and pathways of communion with God. Night Chapel takes on a personal and candid tone that is refreshing for students who often engage in theological writings and Scripture within the structure and demand of academic rigor. A few examples of this refreshing tone are students have expressed their grief on a communal board for people to read, been given journal prompts and provided time and space to answer the prompts privately, and have answered the question, "God is \_\_\_\_\_ and I know this because \_\_\_\_\_" and exchanged it for others to read them out loud. By engaging in these kinds of creative activities, students cultivate individual and corporate communion with God in a formative and tactile way of practicing their faith.

The impact Night Chapel has on students is enriching to their spiritual lives because of its intimacy and depth. That spiritual and worshipful environment is built by students discerning God's message, inviting others to serve and lead, creativity in our practice and communion with God, and gathering as one body to share in this relationship with God.

#### SPRING SPORTS REPORT: BASEBALL BUILDS CULTURE

With over 30 men taking the field for the first time together this fall, the Bushnell baseball team has certainly had their work cut out for them in building a successful team, and more importantly, a successful culture.

Taking the practice field this fall for the first time in over 50 years, Head Coach Tommy Richards wanted to quickly establish a team that values feedback, optimism, collective responsibility, and discipline. "Winning starts in the locker room and is player-driven," he said. "Our job as coaches is to make sure the right people are on the bus and fully equipped for a successful journey, but ultimately the players drive the thing."

Creating that culture would be a challenge for a seasoned program, but a monumental task when there is no immediate history to draw upon.

Richards said, "In normal circumstance you have a core of returning players who understand the team dynamic and can help impart the daily rhythms to the newcomers. We didn't have that luxury, but our guys have done a great job of getting on the same page. We ask a lot of them on the field, in the weight room, and in the classroom and through those daily efforts and struggles is where I think the culture is fostered."


Internally dubbed the "Founding Fathers" launching the NAIA-era baseball program, the players are filled with a sense of pride to be part of something unique. According to Jacob Richardson, a freshman outfielder from Auburn, California, "This is a once in a lifetime opportunity. Not many people get to say they were the inaugural team of a sport.

"The 'Founding Fathers' is more than just a fresh team of players, though. It is the beginning of a culture and setting standards that will be maintained throughout the lifetime of the program. In order for a program to be successful, it must have a foundation of integrity and hard work. That is something I believe every guy on our team brings to the table."

Freshman Catcher Brandon Reed, from Salem, said, "Though it may be challenging, it is also a wonderful experience that we are all taking in stride, we are coming together as a team more each and every day."

"It has been a humbling learning experience for all of us," according to Junior Catcher and

Olympia, Washington native Kyle Casperson. "We have great leaders on the team on each side of the ball. There are guys from all over, all ages, and all experience levels. It is awesome to watch all of us bounce ideas off each other and get better day in and day out."

The team is also quick to recognize the hard work, passion, and dedication of the coaching staff that has assembled for the inaugural run. The coaches have established a player-first focus and are praised for sticking to that philosophy.

Ethan Paulson, a junior pitcher from Encinitas, California said, "The coaching staff is so focused and dedicated to our development and this is the first time in a long time where I am genuinely excited to go to practice every day. It is rare to find such an invested group of coaches.

"The coaches have been nothing short of amazing," said junior first baseman Jeff Fripp, a native of Orange Park, Florida. "These guys are out there every day, rain or shine, trying to push us to be the best men on and off the field. They are great leaders and if we continue to learn and grow together then this group will be hard to beat."

Peyton Hino, a freshman outfielder from Honolulu, Hawaii added, "This has been some of the best coaching I have had in my entire baseball career. The staff has been extremely supportive and disciplined when it comes to their player's goals and how to achieve them."

Junior pitcher Daniel Furman said, "I love the new-team feeling. We come in with a clean slate and get to create a program and a culture from the ground up. We get to create the foundation for years to come and I am excited to get on the field and get some wins."

#### **BEACON VOLLEYBALL SEES UNPRECEDENTED SUCCESS**

This fall, the Bushnell volleyball team experienced an historic year, breaking numerous records on their way to a second straight appearance in the NAIA National Championship Tournament.

Bushnell finished the season with a record of 21-8, and claimed a fourth-place finish in the Cascade Collegiate Conference. There were selected as one of 12 at-large bids for the national tournament and competed in the opening round, traveling to Butte, Montana to face Montana Tech.

The season ended with a tough five-set loss to the Orediggers, but that did not detract from a stellar season. The Beacons set a new single-season school record for overall wins (21) and conference wins (16). Their seven-match winning streak in September and October tied for the largest ever, and the team set a new record for team offense, earning an attack percentage of .212.

One of the many highlights for the season came in mid-October. Bouncing back from their first home loss of the season to Eastern Oregon, Bushnell faced undefeated Corban University at home on October 12. The Warriors came into the Morse Center ranked No. 6 in the NAIA, and left with "Their seven-match winning streak in September and October tied for the largest ever."



their first loss of the season, a dominant 25-23, 26-24, 27-25 sweep by the Beacons.

For Bushnell, it was the first-ever victory over an NAIA Top-10 ranked team. Head Coach Jason Corwin said at the time, "There is no such thing as a perfect match, but we got all phases of the game going tonight. We did such a good job of managing the opportunities in front of us and attacking with confidence. It put a lot of pressure on Corban to make plays and tonight they made more errors than they are used to."

The Beacons were led on offense by junior Shay Coons, hitting .342 with 15 kills. Senior libero Callie Wilkins led all players with 14 digs and junior setter Makenna Northern ran the court with aplomb, collecting 40 assists, two kills and two blocks.

Those three athletes, along with Halle Neumann, proved to be the heart and soul of the program all season and they were honored at the end of the vear as members of the All-CCC Team.

Coons was also named to the American Volleyball **Coaches Association All-Northwest Region** team. She ended the year fifth in the conference, averaging 3.36 kills per set and her 316 total kills were the most by a Bushnell player in nine years and the second-highest total in school history.

Wilkins was named the CCC and AVCA-Northwest Region Defensive Player of the Year. She finished the season ranked second in the CCC in digs, averaging 4.56 per set and was sixth in service aces with 34 (0.39 per set).

Northern completed an historic junior season as the CCC Setter of the Year, a first-team All-Northwest Region team member, and for the third time an NAIA All-American honorable mention. She led the conference with 10.44 assists per set and became the Beacon's all-time leader for assists with 3226. She became just the third athlete from a team-sport to earn at least three All-American honors in her career, joining men's basketball players Jon Willis (4, 1983-1986) and Ty Lockard (3, 1994-1996).

The future is bright for the Beacons, who will return most of the core of the team next season, including all four All-CCC players.

From the generosity of those who care deeply for pastors, Bushnell University hosted After Doubt: A special event for pastors and ministry leaders with Dr. AJ Swoboda.

This was a collaboration between the Center for Leadership & Ethics and the School of Bible & World Christianity. This event was free and all in attendance received a complimentary copy of Dr. Swoboda's book, *After Doubt: How to Question Your Faith without Losing It.* 

The event started at 10:30am with a One Hope Pastors prayer gathering. There was an invitation to join for chapel at 11:00am in the Morse gymnasium before reconvening in the Ross Evans Chapel for a free lunch and to hear a presentation by Dr. Swoboda.

In his invitation to local pastors, Dr. Swoboda writes "There is a unique story behind this book. Before serving in academic life as a professor of Bible and theology at Bushnell University, I served in the local church. For the better part of a decade I served in collegeage ministry to students at the University of Oregon. Then, for the better part of another



decade, I planted a church with my wife Quinn in the heart of the Hawthorne district of Portland. The church was called Theophilus. I, like you, watched what kinds of cultural challenges and theological pressure the people we serve now face in an increasingly post-Christian, secular environment.

# What I saw has haunted me. It

The answer, I contend, is "yes"! It is not an easy road. These paths come with difficulty, heartache, honesty, and real truthfulness. But Jesus meets us in the middle of it. Bushnell University is hosting this event in hopes that it serves your work as a pastor and a leader."
